COP26 - A Christian Faith Appeal

On 7th September 2021, Pope Francis, Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew and Archbishop Justin Welby issued *A Joint Message For The Protection of Creation*.

In it they urged everyone to play their part in 'choosing life' for the future of the planet. Warning of the urgency of environmental sustainability, its impact on poverty, and the importance of global cooperation they

....call on everyone, whatever their belief or worldview, to endeavour to listen to the cry of the earth and of people who are poor, examining their behaviour and pledging meaningful sacrifices for the sake of the earth which God has given us.

.... the current climate crisis speaks volumes about who we are and how we view and treat God's creation. biodiversity loss, environmental degradation and climate change are the inevitable consequences of our actions, since we have greedily consumed more of the earth's resources than the planet can endure. But we also face a profound injustice: the people bearing the most catastrophic consequences of these abuses are the poorest on the planet and have been the least responsible for causing them.'

Their joint declaration concludes with a clear warning:

Today, we are paying the price...Tomorrow could be worse'. Its conclusion brings home the urgency of COP26: 'This is a critical moment. Our children's future and the future of our common home depend on it.

The statement calls on people to pray and act.

During these final weeks until COP26 we will offer suggestions for both.

COP26 - Global Inequality

The human environment and the natural environment deteriorate together; we cannot adequately combat environmental degradation unless we attend to causes related to human and social degradation. In fact, the deterioration of the environment and of society affects the most vulnerable people on the planet: "Both everyday experience and scientific research show that the gravest effects of all attacks on the environment are suffered by the poorest"...... we have to realize that a true ecological approach always becomes a social approach; it must integrate questions of justice in debates on the environment, so as to hear *both the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor*.

COP26 - Global Justice

Climate change is also an ongoing threat to poverty reduction, and it will intensify in coming years. New analyses for this report estimate that climate change will drive 68 million to 135 million into poverty by 2030. Climate change is a particularly grave threat for countries of Sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia — the regions where most of the global poor are concentrated. The impacts of climate change can also include higher food prices, deteriorating health conditions, and exposure to disasters, such as floods, that affect both the poor and the general population.

Especially for the poorest small countries, climate change is perhaps the most vexing challenge, and the problem is not of those countries' making. Human-induced rises in global temperatures and sea levels are almost entirely a product of levels of energy use by high-income nations and large, rapidly growing middle-income countries.

COP26 - Responding to Code Red Report for Humanity

In **August 2021** the UN Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) report, compiled by more than 230 climate scientists, warned that major climate disruption is inevitable and, in many instances, irreversible. The UN Secretary General António Guterres said:

Today's IPCC Working Group 1 Report is a 'Code Red' for humanity... This report must sound a death knell for coal and fossil fuels, before they destroy our planet.

In June 2018 Pope Francis said:

As you know, in December 2015, 196 Nations negotiated and adopted the Paris Agreement, with a firm resolve to limit the growth in global warming to below 2° centigrade, based on preindustrial levels, and, if possible, to below 1.5° centigrade. Some two and a half years later, carbon dioxide emissions and atmospheric concentrations of greenhouse gases remain very high. This is disturbing and a cause for real concern.

Yet even more worrying is the continued search for new fossil fuel reserves, whereas the Paris Agreement clearly urged keeping most fossil fuels underground. This is why we need to talk together – industry, investors, researchers and consumers – about transition and the search for alternatives. Civilization requires energy, but energy use must not destroy civilization!

In their 2021 Pastoral Letter on the Sixth Anniversary of Laudato Si' the Bishops of Scotland stated:

The dioceses of Scotland are in the process of divesting from fossil fuel investments. The Bishops' Conference is aiming for carbon neutrality for its agencies, as are the dioceses in as sustainable and timely a way as possible.

We pray that all world leaders may take the necessary action to abandon the extraction and use of coal and fossil fuels.
